If we're made in the image of God, why should we not be surprised there's something of trinity within all of us? What makes you a 'person'? What does it mean that Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are each a separate, if ultimate, Person? What does this make possible for us? Greek philosophers, like Aristotle, believed that God was static, unmoved, fixed, and in control of everything/ everyone. Any show of emotion or need for relationship was, to them, a sign of weakness – being needy. Why might they have believed this? How does it compare to God's self-revelation in Scripture? As shown by Jesus? Does this Greek philosophy linger in the Church today? By contrast, the Cappadocian Fathers (4th Century, Eastern Turkey/ Syria) described the relationship/ interactions within Trinity God as perichoresis (peri = 'around' + choreuo = 'to make room, give way'). Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are like three dancers, moving, reacting, anticipating one another: at times they appear as three; at other times, they're so in-synch and fast, they appear as one. How helpful do you find this image of moving, dancing, dynamic, acting/ re-acting, God? Why? How did/ does John 1:14 challenge Greek philosophy? When have you seen/ experienced moving, dancing God at work in your/ other's life?
