Start	☐ What do you find harder: to pick up a book or to put it down?☐ What, for you, makes for a good book?		
Discuss	 □ What is the Bible? □ Where did the Bible come from? □ "What we know as the Bible is in fact a library of 66 separate 'books' (a mix of historical accounts, legal documents, poetry & song lyrics, letters, prophecies) written over 1500+ years by 40+ people from 3 Continents drawn from numerous cultures, and languages". Discuss! □ How did the invention of the printing press – 1,500 years after Christ – change who could access/ read the Bible? What understanding could have been lost with the switch from 66 scrolls to one book? Why does this matter? □ Similarly, how are Smartphones/ Internet Apps changing the way we access, and even understand, the Bible today?

Explore	 □ v.16: Why was <i>this</i> town challenging for Jesus? What's your 'hometown' experience as a Christian? How are habits/ customs cultivated? Why is <i>habit/custom</i> so important when it comes to gathering for worship? (If you are open to 'standing up to read' the Bible in a service, speak to Elaine Gerard!) □ v.17: How do we navigate around the Bible? What are your tips? By handing Jesus the Isaiah scroll, how might they have been testing him? □ v.18-19: Why did Jesus select this section to read, even thought it would have taken so long to get to/ find it? (Isaiah scroll was 7.3m long). To what extent do you think Isaiah knew who he was writing about/ predicting? □ v.20-21: When have you read the Bible and sensed God was speaking to you/ about you? What was Jesus claiming? Read John 1:1-2. Who is the Word of God, Jesus or the Bible? 		
Go further	 □ Read Isaiah 61:1-2 and compare to Luke 4:18-19. What did Jesus omit? Why? Who's understanding of 'good news' was better, Isaiah's or Jesus's? □ Both Isaiah 61:1-2 and Luke 4:18-19 are in the Bible; they are both Scripture – similar and yet different. How do you explain this? □ Read John 1:1-2. What or who is the Word of God? □ "The Bible is the Spirit-inspired, unfolding story of God and God's people. Through it, we can trace a growing understanding and revelation of God through successive generations. What begins as an inspired hunch in Genesis, gradually, with each successive generation, becomes ever clearer/sharper. Then, boom, Jesus, THE Word of God – the image of the invisible
