I've been asked to write a pen portrait, not quite sure what that means, so to put Wendy into context, it might be easier to work backwards! I'm the one who sits at the back of the church on Sundays in order to beat a hasty retreat.

I came back to Chester Road around 2012/2013 just as my mum was diagnosed with Alzheimer's. She died in 2014.

I'd been volunteering at foodbank since its inception. We'd decided we'd extend foodbank by adding a job club, which I was all in favour of - retired teacher and all! For some inexplicably reason Danny asked me to join the one here. So the CRBC job club was created with Mike Miller, Ken Hawkings et moi. I followed that event by becoming a church member. Our job club has been supporting Timberley Lane Baptist Church with their Life Hub.

Originally I'd been at CRBC way back in the 1970's as part of the youth group when Gethin Abraham-Williams was the minister. It's far too complicated to explain why and how I joined the youth group, suffice to say the death of my sister, Maxine aged 6 was a major consideration. I was baptised here in 1971 and then decided to go to teacher's training college, which I did - miles away in Walsall!

From that point I never returned to CRBC. I taught for a while in Walsall and then went to London to teach in Walthamstow (the Kray twins country) whilst attending Bible College in Kennington. I was based at St Andrews Church in Ilford where, together with a band of 4 musicians, we were invited to a variety of churches in and around Essex, preaching and working with youth groups.

Returning to Brum in the 1980's I joined the GB, becoming both a company officer and the District Adjutant; based at a local baptist church where, unexpected and traumatic events rocked my world. At that point I decided church wasn't for me - Jesus - yes, but the institution, a loud resounding no.

I taught in Sparkhill at a large comprehensive school; I was the deputy headteacher. Teaching held all the challenges that impacts on young adults so no two days were ever the same. Aside from teaching, part of my responsibilities included staff well-being and dealing with naughty boys and girls, a job I thoroughly enjoyed.

Towards 2011 my mum became seriously unwell with her dementia, so I took early retirement and I felt I should give church another try. For whatever reason, there was a strong pull to CRBC. However, traumatic events leave deep scars so from kicking and screaming every Sunday, I'm now writing a pen portrait and still standing.

As with us all, there are strange confusing twists and turns that happen in our life journey; not knowing what the future holds and sometimes being held hostage to our past. Something I'm still wrestling with.

However, it maybe that some of my life experiences can be used at CRBC; so, bravely and audaciously personalising the words of the late great Arthur Ashe, "I'll start where I am. I'll use what I have. I'll do what I can." to hopefully support the present leadership team.
